


RIGHTS

What are international children's rights?

Human rights are the basic standards that people need to live in dignity. All human beings are entitled to enjoy human rights. Human rights exist to make sure that we are treated properly and fairly, and given the freedom to develop to our full potential, and to promote our wellbeing.

In addition to the rights that are available to all people, there are rights that apply only to children. Children need special rights because of their unique needs - they need additional protection that adults don't. The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) is an international document that sets out all of the rights that children have.



What rights do children have?

The UNCRC has 54 articles (sections), and most of these articles list a different right that children have, and different responsibilities that the Government, and others, have to





How does the school reinforce children's rights?

At Adderley we make a promise to help every child to reach their potential. As a school we honour the rights listed in the UNCRC and are currently working towards the UNICEF Rights Respecting Schools Award. Children learn about their rights through PSHE lessons and topical assemblies themed around global issues, such as hunger, refugees and fair trade. All children are encouraged to think about how their behaviour and actions may affect others.

RIGHTS

Pupil voice is a regular feature of school life. Our pupil leaders meet regularly to discuss any concerns or suggestions that may have been raised to them from other children. The UNICEF team have a steering group which parents are welcome to join. Please speak to Mr Hussain for further details!







What can parents do to support the rights of all children?

We encourage our parents to make pledges to do something that will show their support of all children everywhere. Here are some examples:

- I pledge to save energy/electricity so that all children have a chance to grow up in a sustainable world.
- I pledge to talk to my child about countries where children do not enjoy all of their rights.
- I pledge to make sure that my children have a healthy diet.
- I pledge to talk to my child when important decisions are made at home.
- I pledge to help my child with their education at home.
- I pledge to buy Fair Trade products so that more children can grow up enjoying all their rights.
- I promise to respect the rights of children in my community.
- I promise to donate money/time to charities that promote the rights of the child.

This half term we have been learning all about cows and the animals that live on a farm. We looked at the story 'The Ugly Duckling'. We talked about how the Ugly Duckling was feeling very sad as nobody wanted to play with him and they were treating him differently because he did not look like the other ducklings. He was only happy when he turned into a beautiful swan and the other swans became his friends.





Have you ever wondered why the sky changes colour from day to night? Why the sky goes from clear blue to dark grey as the seasons change? Well Year 1 have been splendidly curious about our wonderful sky. We have been learning all about how the weather changes across different seasons and the effects that extreme weather has on us and our world.

Our bird watching activity engaged us with our new topic as we explored the outdoors and the wildlife that Adderley Park brings to our school. The most common birds that we found were Seagulls and Magpies. We had to look high in the sky and in between trees as well as on top of buildings and rooftops.

TOWERS, TUNNELS AND TURRETS

We've been learning all about 'Towers, Tunnels and Turrets' as part of our new project. Our visit to Warwick Castle helped us to see (with our own eyes!) why these amazing buildings were built in the past. This castle, built by William the Conqueror, helped us understand some of the features of castles and towers. We learnt all about the different features of a castle such as the keep, battlements, bailey, moat etc. We know where they are in a castle and the purpose of them.

As well as learning about the historical importance of Warwick Castle, children also took part in different activities and tours, including a falconry display and fun swordsmanship workshop! Altogether, it was a breath-taking educational visit for all the children in Year 2.

Back at school we watched the film 'Tangled'
which introduced us to the character of
Rapunzel and how she was trapped in a tower. We
then created our own castles and towers for
Rapunzel using junk modelling materials. We had
to work together effectively as a group and we
had to ensure that we included most of the key
features of a castle. We had so much fun working
together to create our dream castle for Rapunzel.





We also created our own timeline to identify how castles have changed over the years. We learnt all about the 7 wonders of the world and located them on the world map. This made us more aware of the different countries around the world and where they are situated.


In Art & Design we learnt how to sketch famous towers around the world. We concentrated on the use of lines and tone. It was so much fun pretending to be artists for the afternoon. We had to look really carefully at the sketches in order to create our own drawing.

Also during this half term we performed our Chinese New Year assembly.

We learnt all about why Chinese New Year is celebrated and the story
behind it. We worked really hard to practise our lines and the songs.

Children performed a range of musical pieces to their parents in another wonderful concert. We were all extremely impressed at their skills and proficiency in their chosen instrument.

To ensure our talented musicians continue to flourish in their areas of Music; elected children in Years 5 and 6 receive tuition from Birmingham Music Services for up to an hour per week.

This tutoring involves developing core skills within specific instruments, such as: Violin, Keyboards and Cornets.















Year 5 also took a trip to the Symphony Hall to listen to BBC's Ten Pieces.


Its aim is to open up the world of classical music to a new generation of children and inspire them to develop their own creative responses to ten pieces of music.














Off With Her Head!

Year 5 children were privileged to start off their Summer term with a visit to Tudor World Museum in Stratford Upon Avon where they took part in workshops on Crime and Punishment, Tudor Theatre and learnt of every day Tudor life before going on a tour of Stratford Upon Avon led by William Shakespeare! Here the children were able to visit famous landmarks such as Shakespeare's house, his school and his burial ground as well as learning about what inspired his writing.

Moreover, in our Music lessons, the children have been learning of Henry VIII's complicated relationships with his 6 wives and have been learning the words to Green Sleeves; a song composed by Henry VIII to woo Anne Boleyn. Children have also had the opportunity to visit Symphony Hall and listen to Ten Pieces of classical music composed by BBC Live Orchestra.



E SAFETY

We know that younger and younger children are using technology, which goes without saying. So we have to allow them to enjoy this use of technology whilst keeping them safe. Follow these simple steps to help keep your child safe online.

Put yourself in control

Install parental controls on your home broadband and any internet-enabled devices. Set up a user account for your child on the main device they use and make sure other accounts in the household are password-protected so that younger children can't access them by accident.

Agree boundaries

Be clear what your child can and can't do online – where they can use the internet, how much time they can spend online, the sites they can visit and the type of information they can share. Agree with your child when they can use a device.

Stay involved

Put your computer or main device in a shared area like the living room or kitchen so you can keep an eye on how they're using the internet and also share in their enjoyment.

Talk to siblings

It's also a good idea to talk to any older children about what they're doing online and what they show to younger children. Encourage them to be responsible and help keep their younger siblings safe.

Search safely

Use safe search engines such as Swiggle or Kids-search. You can save time by adding these to your 'Favourites'. Safe search settings can also be activated on Google and other search engines, as well as YouTube.

Explore together

The best way to find out what your child is doing online is to ask them to tell you about what they do and what sites they like to visit. If they're happy to, ask them to show you. Talk to them about being a good friend online.

Use airplane mode

Use airplane mode on your devices when your child is using them so they can't make any unapproved purchases or interact with anyone online without your knowledge.

Check if it's suitable

The age ratings that come with games, apps, films and social networks are a good guide to whether they're suitable for your child. For example, the minimum age limit is 13 for several social networking sites, including Facebook and Instagram. Although sites aimed at under-10s like Moshi Monsters and Club Penguin also have social networking elements.




ONSITE AND OFFSITE RESIDENTIAL
